Important Reminder about Parking

It is really important for the safety of our children, other pedestrians, road users and our School Crossing Patrol, that people do not park on double yellow lines and in particular close to the school crossing area.

Doing so significantly increases the risk of an accident happening. It also has a big impact on the visibility of the School Crossing Patrol person. There will be spot checks carried out by 'Parking Services' council staff and local police to monitor the situation and they may approach anyone in breach of parking restrictions.

Nursery




This week, the children have being exploring the changing season. They have been very interested in collecting natural resources. 
Reception

We have been busy learning the story of 'The Little Red Hen' this week. We made some masks to help us to act out the story and we have even planted some wheat grain just like the little red hen did. We hope that ours will grow just like the little red hen's did! In Read, write inc we have learned the sounds n, p, g and o - please see your child's Seesaw for more information. In Numeracy, we have written the number one with help from 'King One' and the numberblocks have helped us with our maths. We have learned that 'one and another one makes two' and that we can say 'one add one makes two!' We've also been learning to use the words 'tallest/taller than' and 'shortest/shorter than' when describing the height of objects (instead of big and small). The Coventry school nurses joined us online to talk about the importance of hand washing. We discussed how, why and when we need to wash our hands. Year 1

In Year 1, in the children have been writing about the story Ruby's Worry. The children have explored different emotions and written their own sentences about the story. In Maths, the children have been learning to compare numbers. They have been learning how to find one more and one less and they have been able to say which number is smaller and which number is greater. The children enjoyed drawing some bird's eye view maps of the school in Geography lessons and they have explored the properties 'rough and smooth' in Science.

Year 2

Year 2 were excited to start their new text in English this week! We started reading the story "Salty Dogs." Before reading the story, the children made predictions about what they thought would happen in the story. Some children thought that the Salty Dogs would be on the hunt for bones because dogs like bones. We are looking forward to seeing if some of these predictions are correct! We also discussed which pirate island we would like to visit and why Crossbone Island was a popular choice because the children believed treasure would be found there. In Maths, we have been completing missing number lines. The children have enjoyed using the large number lines to 100 in the classroom to help them. We also learnt what the word "estimate" means and we have been estimating where numbers would go on number lines with missing intervals. The children have also enjoyed comparing numbers using the more than/less than symbols. Ask your child how crocodiles help them remember these! In Science, we investigated which materials were waterproof. The children tested paper, plastic and paper towel. They found out that plastic was the most waterproof and would be a good material to make a diving suit out of. In History, the children ordered the story of Lady Godiva. They also enjoyed acting out the story. Some children shared their experiences of going to visit the Lady Godiva exhibit in the Herbert Gallery.

Please can we encourage all children to read at home and to bring their reading diaries into school. We expect children to be reading at least 5 times a week at home.

Year 3

Year 3 have had a fantastic week. We have enjoyed reading more of Stig of the Dump and learnt lots more about the story. We have used the story to identify the different characters and settings and learnt lots more adjectives to put into our writing. In Maths, we have finished our place value unit and are ready to move on to addition and subtraction next week. The children are really looking forward to learning the column method. In Science, we learnt about fossilisation and identified the five steps of how a fossil is formed. The children did really well with this and found it really interesting. In History, we learnt about Stonehenge. We watched some fantastic videos of how Stonehenge was built all those years ago and researched lots of facts about the famous monument. Another great week of learning from Year 3! Can we please remind parents to read with their child five times a week so they can get their stamp.

Year 4

In Year 4 this week, we have begun to read a non-fiction book called 'Everything Ancient Egypt' and we will be writing a non-chronological report on an aspect of this topic in two weeks time. The writing skills we have learnt this week are past tense and third person. In reading, we have learnt all about glossaries and contents pages. In maths, we have been rounding to the nearest 10, 100 and 1,000. In arithmetic, we have been practising how to add 1,000s mentally to four-digit numbers. In Science, we have learnt about why some changes of state are irreversible. In History, we had an amazing day with our Ancient Egyptian visitor who commented on the impressive historic knowledge of all the children.

Year 5

This week in Year 5, the children who have been going swimming have made so much progress! All of the teachers have been so amazed at their growth in confidence, and their abilities in the water. In our English lessons, we have been preparing to and writing our short story based on the Michael Morpurgo text we are reading 'Friend or Foe' and again, we have been astounded by the quality of work produced in the lessons. Well done to all of the children! The Children in 5Gamma have been continuing their work on World War II, and they have been learning about the different countries involved in the War. Children have learnt about the different allies and axis as well as coming up with their own questions to deepen their understanding based on what they have learnt already. 5Gamma parents, just a reminder that next week your children will be going swimming every afternoon, and they will return to school at the later time of 3:45.

Year 6

In English this week, Year 6 have been learning about suspense and tension in their writing and they have practised using relative clauses so that they can extend their sentences when trying to create suspense in their own writing. In maths, we have been learning about, prime, squared and cubed numbers and now we know that prime numbers only have 2 factors! In History, we have been learning about the structure of society in the Maya civilization and how priests and rulers were the most respected in their society. We learnt about the different hieroglyphs that Maya used to write - they used pictures and symbols to represent sounds - and we used them to write our names!

YEAR 2 = 2 GAMMA


YEAR 3 = 3 DELTA


