#### **Important Reminder about Parking**

We have received a number of complaints recently from local residents living in roads around school, including Rylston Avenue, Halford Lane and Sadler Road.

The issues are around people blocking driveways, blocking roads, parking on double yellow lines, parking on the school patrol area, parking irresponsibly and some reports of verbal abuse.

The school will be contacting the local police and 'Parking Services' at the Council to ask for them to come out and do spot checks and to look at any other measures which could be implemented to help resolve the issues.

It is really important for the safety of our children, other pedestrians, road users and our School Crossing Patrol, that people do not park on double yellow lines and in particular **close to the school crossing area.** Doing so significantly increases the risk of an accident happening. It also has a big impact on the visibility of the School Crossing Patrol person. There will be spot checks carried out by 'Parking Services' council staff and local police to monitor the situation and they may approach anyone in breach of parking restrictions.

In the interest of health and safety and good neighbour relations, please can parents/carers take care to park responsibility when dropping off and collecting pupils around the school site. We have received feedback to say that some cars are blocking driveways, parking on yellow lines or blocking the pavement. Many thanks for your co-operation.

#### Nursery

This week Nursery have been practising using glue sticks. Firstly, the children used paper shapes to make a picture of their faces. # Reception

This week in Reception we have created a story map to help us to retell the story of 'The Little Red Hen' in sequence. We used some actions and pictures to help us to remember the sentences. We also baked some bread just like the little red hen. We hope that the fresh bread tasted delicious! Can your child remember the ingredients that we used? In Numeracy we made a 'two' poster and found lots of things that showed 2. We also sorted objects into items that showed 2 and items that did NOT show 2. We had to explain our choices. #### Year 1

Year 1 have started reading the story 'Journey'. There are no words in the book and the children have to tell the story themselves using the pictures. In Maths, the children have been learning how to find more and less and learning how to use a number line to help them. In Geography, the children looked outside of the school through the gates and used Google maps. They identified human features and physical features around our school. In Science this week, the children have learnt about the properties bendy and rigid.

#### Year 2

Year 2 have had another busy, yet fun-filled week this week! The children are thoroughly enjoying reading "Salty Dogs" in English. They took part in a conscience alley where the children had to give arguments for whether the salty dogs should swim and continue on their mission or whether they should sink and go home. In Maths, the children have been learning how to count in 2s, 5s and 10s. They enjoyed using 100 squares to complete missing number tracks. The children spotted patterns and were able to say which number didn't fit the patterns. In Arithmetic, the children used different methods to find ½ of a number. In History, the children enjoyed creating their own comic strips about the story of Lady Godiva. They used picture prompts to help them retell the story.

It is lovely to hear that lots of the children are going into Coventry City Centre to visit the Lady Godiva statue. Please send class teachers a photo of this on class dojo as it would be lovely to show the other children. In Science, the children investigated which materials were absorbent. They found out that paper towel sucks up water and would be a good material to clean up spillages. Whereas wood and plastic were not absorbent. The children thoroughly enjoyed celebrating world mental health day this week. They spent some time outside and drew pictures of the clouds they could see. Lots of the children said it helped them to relax and it is something they would like to do at home!

# Year 3

Year 3 have had a lovely week and have learnt lots of new things. We have read the first two chapters of our adventure book and the children have begun to plan a story of their own. They will be writing their own adventure stories next week using their own setting. We have taught them how to use adjectives and prepositions to add detail and interest to the story. In maths we have started our new topic of addition and subtraction and the children have been learning how to use their place value knowledge to add 100's, 10's and 1's. In science we have been learning

about a famous palaeontologist called Mary Anning who discovered dinosaur fossils! In history the children have learnt about the Bell Beaker People who helped change stone age life and marked the beginning of the Bronze Age era. Thank you for the ongoing support of parents and carers . Can we please remind parents and carers to read with their child five times a week , complete homework, and continue to practice the 3 times table. Miss Kukathasan, Miss Khan (Year 3 Leader) and Miss Waddell Year 4 In Year 4 this week, we have continued to read the book 'Everything Ancient Egypt.' We have learnt how use fronted adverbials and write a cohesive paragraph. In maths, we have moved onto addition and subtraction, this week concentrating on adding and subtracting one or two-digit numbers to numbers up to thousands. In history we have been learning about pyramids and writing instructions on how to mummify a body. In RHE, we have been talking about mental health and ways to keep your mind healthy. In science, we have learnt all about the water cycle. ## **Reporting Absence & Appointments**


